Diplomas will be presented to the graduates by Father John Martin of St. Pius X Seminary, Uniondale. Father Edward Dexter of Pretoria, South Africa will deliver the address to the graduates.

Following the presentations, Lucille Abate will give the class valedictory speech and the class of '67 will sing the school song.

Father Gerald Hogan of St. Francis Assisi Church, Medford, Massachusetts will officiate at Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Assisting Father Hogan will be Father Ralph Monteleone, deacon, and Father Mortimer Gleason, subdeacon.

### Phi Beta Kappa Winner To Be Valedictorian; National Merit Scholar To Welcome Parents

Lucille has achieved the highest cumulative average: 95.31. She is the recipient of the Phi Beta Kappa Award for excellence. This carries a full tuition scholarship to Adelphi University, C. W. Post College, and Hofstra University. Lucille is also the winner of a full four year scholarship to St. John's University which she has accepted. Besides her scholastic achievements, Lucille takes an active part in the Glee Club, the Spanish Club, and the recently formed Greek Club. She is one member of the class of '67 who has had an unbroken record of attendance since her entrance into Seton in September, 1963.

Salutatorian, Gary Roscott, has reaped a number of honors. His four year average of 93.47 marks him as the highest boy in the class of 179 students. This has won Gary a scholarship to Brown University and also the ninth Annual Paragon Oil Award. He was also a National Merit Scholarship finalist. Like Lucille, Gary spends his spare time in school activities. He is an active member of the Political Science Club; he belongs to the tennis and track teams, and he is co-editor of Milestones 1967, the senior's yearbook.


### Co-Editors Hail Editor: John is People's Choice!


His success is not limited to the journalistic field, however. He has been notified of his acceptance to the two colleges to which he applied: Fordham and Niagara.

Speech, Debate, and Journalism chevrons and letters were given by Father Ed










Helen will attend Stonehill College with hopes of a career in social work. About school, Helen said "I love Seton Hall — if I had to do it again I would... with a few changes."

### Future Pilot Opts For Syracuse



Making her debut against Q.R.A., frosh Chris Kenah pitched a 6-3 victory. The girls fine form and game gave the clue that this team was one to watch.



At press time, John Rooney topped hitting with an average of over .400. Naturally, John was elected on the All Long Island team as short stop.

Seton seized the championship in the victory over Saint Mary's.
